The Victorian Ghost Hunter, Andrew Selwyn Crome, dressed in a black dress coat and wearing a top hat, came to Swavesey for our September meeting. Andrew was an informative and entertaining speaker. The Victorians were very interested in ghosts and invented it as a science. Sir Arthur Conan Doyle and Harry Houdini were interested in the spirit world and Charles Dickens was one of the founder members of the Ghost Club (1862).

Victorians used photos to show ghosts existed; it was later proved that they were made up! Andrew also described the essential contents of a ghost hunter's kit.

Abbey House, Abbey Road, Cambridge was said to be haunted by a nun and in 1950 she haunted the family living in the house.

Hale Road Allotment

Everybody wants to stay

The sixty plot holders at Hale Road allotments in Swavesey consist of individuals, couples, families both with young and older children, retired, working and young persons. National Allotment Society guidance indicates that a newly set up site should anticipate that around 30% of plot holders will throw in the towel by the end of year two, partly because the novelty has worm off but more commonly because growing crops successfully takes far more time and effort than expected. The Hale Road site was set up in autumn 2012 and surprisingly, despite two seasons of hard work, our lot are all far too happy to want to give up.

Some of the reasons for an ongoing feeling of wellbeing are:-

- With the assistance of Trinity Farm the entire site was securely fenced all round to keep out pesky things such as rabbits and deer, making it unnecessary to fence off individual plots, a major benefit.
- Thanks to Freisland Farm we have eight large water tanks on site with no plot more than 30 metres away. Two plot holders can easily dip watering cans at the same time and could even take a bath together if they felt so inclined.
- During 2014 we have spread a significant quantity of bulky organic manure on our
 plots. This included around 10 tonnes of well-rotted cattle manure from Highfield
 Farm down Ramper Road plus around 15 tonnes of horse poo from Fenwillow Farm,
 down Market Street and a documented 76 tonnes of compost (soil improver) delivered
 from AmeyCespa at Waterbeach. We do things on an agricultural scale on our site.

The only slightly disappointing issue is that we continue to have around twelve local residents on our waiting list who are keen to join in the fun with a plot of their own. Our Chairman has much sympathy for these unlucky people and would like to do something to help them. Indeed, as a step to that end he has suggested that in 2015 the plot rent should be doubled to £80 in order to test what the market will stand but the management committee won't let him get away with it.

As skill increased, crops grew better in 2014 and most plot holders quite sensibly grew somewhat fewer courgettes and runner beans. However, soft fruit crops have established so strongly that some were beginning to feel slightly queasy at the sight of yet more strawberries and raspberries in summer. All that organic manure will help to produce even stronger crop growth in 2015.

A noticeable defect of our site is that quite an area is affected by surface ponding in winter. To help to overcome this we were lucky enough to be awarded a very generous grant by the Big Lottery Fund to pay for trench digging plus supply of plastic drainage pipe and crushed brick rubble. In early August plot holders worked as a team in harmony carting brick rubble in their wheelbarrows to the drainage lines.

On the evening of Tuesday 14 October we held a social gathering in the Compass Room and the Meridian Hall at the Bethel Baptist church. There we paid our rent for 2015 then collected a copy of the Kings Seeds catalogue which allows us to purchase identical vegetable and flower seeds at half the price, or less, than from other seed houses. Following that, an up-market quiz night, being a sophisticated combination of general knowledge and music, was organised jointly by our Treasurer and our Vice-Chairman in Swavesey Memorial Hall on Saturday 15 November. The rowdy crowd of plot holders and their friends had a really super time.

Finally, our second AGM was held in the Bethel Baptist Church on Tuesday 18 November, with a much higher proportion of plot holders attending than for an average AGM. The administration structure was put in place to continue our success into year three. Meanwhile, back on the allotment site broad beans, spring cabbages, onions, garlic and shallots have established uniformly on many plots and are waiting for spring. Furthermore, the next delivery of compost is already scheduled for Thursday 9 April 2015.

Back in August I had an idea. I thought that one thing Swavesey was missing was a café. Two weeks later I entered into an agreement with the Pavilion Committee and quit my full-time job. On October 17th my idea became a reality when Pinks Café on the Green opened its doors. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the members of the Pavilion Committee for their support and enthusiasm for this project, because without it the café would still be an idea.

Why Pinks? Because that was the name of my Nan, given to her by her father when she was born because she was a very pink baby; and it stuck. I never heard anyone refer to her by anything other than Pink, Nanny Pink, Auntie Pink, or occasionally Mrs Smart. Naming the café was one of the easier decisions I had to make. Having never done anything like this before I had no idea how many different types of coffee machines I would have to choose from, or the numerous types of coffee there are available. Should I go for ready-ground or beans? Traditional Espresso or Bean-to-Cup? What food shall I put on the menu? How much shall I charge?

After extensive research and a lot of help and advice from the Environmental Health Department the menu was finalised, the business was registered, and following our recent assessment we have been awarded a 5 Star hygiene certificate.

We are currently open from 9am - 4pm on Tuesdays and Fridays, offering a basic menu including bacon rolls, pastries, sandwiches, panini's, hot and cold drinks and, of course, home-made cakes. Suggestions for additions to the menu are always welcome. If you haven't got time to stop, everything on the menu is available to take away.

We have a facebook page: www.facebook.com/pinkscafe, where I put details of any changes in opening times, the types of cakes we are offering, daily/weekly specials, and anything else I think our customers may be interested in.

I would like to say a big 'Thank You' to everyone who has used the café so far for their support, and for bearing with us while we have been finding our feet, especially as we were sharing the space with the SWAG Bar initially while the pub was closed for refurbishment.

You no longer need to use your car for lunch out with the family or a catch-up with friends over a cup of coffee (and cake!). Just walk or get on your bike and visit Pinks Café, where you will be sure of a warm welcome.

Young people have their say on policing

An all-party parliamentary group for children recently published the findings of an 18-month inquiry, which said that children and young people's first contact with the police was vital in shaping their attitudes towards them.

Once a negative encounter has occurred, it takes time and hard work to change ingrained attitudes, which are often passed on from one generation to the next. Understanding the views of young people and helping them have a more positive attitude towards the police is one of the aims of work being undertaken by the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for Cambridgeshire.

Sir Graham Bright, Police and Crime Commissioner, said: "I strongly believe that young people need as much support as possible to help set them on the right path and keep them away from a life of crime. This can be helped by engaging with them in the right setting, providing things for them to do and giving them a better understanding of the police and their role. It also helps us understand how young people feel about the criminal justice system and policing. This is why I am funding a number of projects that engage with young people."

Some of the initiatives under way include:

School forums – the Commissioner's Outreach Worker is running a series of forums in schools across Peterborough and Fenland which give students an opportunity to have their say on policing and crime. Sessions are held across Years 7, 10 and 11 discussing topics such as policing priorities from their point of view, reporting crime, anti-social behaviour, hate crime and relationships with the police.

Police cadets – Cambridgeshire's first Police Cadets scheme starts in Peterborough on 05 November. The scheme will promote a practical understanding of policing among young people and encourage the spirit of adventure and good citizenship through volunteering in the community.

Youth fund – The aim of the Youth Fund is to engage young people in positive activities in their community in line with the Commissioner's pledge to 'support work with young people to divert them away from a life of crime'. Charities and community groups can bid for grants of up to £2,000 through the Cambridgeshire Community Foundation. www.cambscf.org.uk/pcc.html

PARISH AND COUNTY NEWS

From Your DC - Sue Ellington

Hello and Happy Christmas to you all.

There is so much going on at South Cambs District Council it is difficult to know what to include in this edition.

The waste and recycling services of South Cambs and City have agreed to merge over the next twelve months. Hopefully you will not see any difference in the service you receive except that your Council will save over £200K in the first year with potential for greater savings in the future. The new South Cambs depot facilities at Waterbeach will also provide depot facilities for The City refuse service when they move from Mill Road, Cambridge. The initial saving have been achieved by changes in working practices, as well as round rationalisation affecting the boundary areas between the two authorities. This is the first of a range of shared services which South Cambs is planning to implement over the next five years. The legal service and building control will link with Huntingdon District Council and Π services will also link with Huntingdon and the City.

The introduction of The City Deal (you will remember the government agreed to provide £500m for infrastructure) will have an increasing influence on the way local authorities are managed. The City, South Cambs and the County Council are forming a management assembly which will include a representative from the University, and the Local Enterprise Council. They will be looking at roads, affordable housing, and job creation and I will keep you abreast of developments.

The NHS Older persons contract for the next five years has finally been placed by the CCG with The United Care Partnership. This partnership includes Addenbrookes NHS Trust and the Cambridgeshire Mental Health Services as well as other partners. This Partnership will form a separate company and subcontract services to various providers including Addenbrookes and voluntary services. The contract will start April 2015 and I shall be monitoring progress.

Parish Council News September/October 2014

Good News

Pond clearing and daffodil planting – The daffodils have been replanted alongside the Buckingway Cycle Way and major pond clearing has been carried out. Our thanks to the Scouts for their help with both projects, SVC students for help with the pond work and to all other helpers from the village.

Electrical Collections. From the three waste electrical item collections we have arranged in the village over the past year, the Parish Council has received a total of £436 in community donations. Grants from this have so far been given to a residents craft group and used to buy plants for the sheltered housing gardens. Community groups are invited to contact the Parish Council for future grants.

Moat Way Play Area – Funding all in. The Parish Council is pleased to report that all of the grant funding applied for has now been confirmed and we have a total of £36,000 for new play equipment for the Moat Way play area. Funding will come from WREN and AmeyCespa. Contracts will now be completed and we hope to have new equipment installed early in the New Year.

County Council

The Cycle Path to Buckingway Business Park was opened on Tuesday 2nd September. The PC has made a bid for local highway improvement monies to set a 40mph speed limited from the village to Buckingway to improve safety for pedestrians and cyclists using the new path.

Flooding following the recent very heavy rain was discussed. Further representations to both SCDC and the County Council are being made. The PC is to reconsider drawing up an emergency plan for such an event. This depends on support from the village.

Mrs Anna Norden the new head of the Primary School came to explain the plans for the extension of the Primary School to replace the mobile classrooms, extend the hall and provide a permanent and more suitable space for the Pre-School and Kids Club. These are all included in a planning application. The PC raised a number of questions and was particularly concerned about parking and traffic issues. These are being pursued with the County Council.

Balfour Beatty are back in the village to complete the street lighting work.

Concern about overcrowding on the guided bus way buses at peak periods was raised.

Parking at the Village College and traffic congestion in Gibraltar Lane was of concern to local residents. The PC is to continue dialogue with the Principal to work to ameliorate the problems.

Hedges overhanging roads and cycleways were discussed. If the hedges abut private land then it is the responsibility of the owner to cut them back under riparian rights laws.

District Council

The exception site housing in Fen Drayton Road is now to be built by SCDC for rent. The PC is concerned that the council housing is subject to a right to buy by tenants and will not be

available for local people needing housing in the long term. Cllr Mark Howell, Portfolio Holder for housing at SCDC attended to explain ways the council was considering to help with the legal constraints they face with right to buy legislation. He agreed to keep the PC informed of progress in this area and to take on board the PC's concerns. He confirmed that when let by SCDC they would be let only to people with strong Swavesey connections.

A number of larger Parish Councils are starting to prepare Neighbourhood Plans. These are village plans that will affect and control development in the parish. They will have a legal status within the Planning Framework. They require a substantial commitment of time and money. The PC decided to await developments and consider linking with other adjacent smaller parishes in the future.

Neighbourhood Watch and Police Business.

The Council received reports from our NHW coordinator.

The PC was made aware of recent events and issues of anti-social behaviour.

Drainage

The Council continues to press for action on a number of drainage concerns with the Environment Agency and SCDC. The PC agreed to go ahead with a press and publicity campaign to raise awareness of the outstanding concerns they have with both the above authorities.

The Internal Drainage Board reported on funding for improvement and maintenance to local waterways and drains.

Village Matters

Various work to trees on community land were agreed to maintain safety.

Planning

A presentation was given to the PC on the latest planning application for Phase 2 of Northstowe. The PC is to object to the Phase 2 application on the grounds that the Conditions for the phase 1 permission, specifically the land drainage improvement scheme works have not been completed according to the specifications approved.

The PC considered and commented on a number of other planning applications.

The Fair

Mr Dean the showman who brought the fair to Swavesey in past years has asked if he can return in 2015. He has suggested it be sited on the recreation green at a time to suit the village. There were a number of concerns related to previous visits. Please contact the clerk with your views to enable the PC to reflect them when considering this request.

Street Lights

Balfour Beatty are now completing all outstanding streetlight installations. The power issues in Boxworth End and Middlewatch are being completed mid November. Gibraltar Lane and Over Road are also scheduled with UK Power Networks for completion of the connection issues.

Balfour Beatty apologise for the inconvenience caused to residents for the time it has taken to complete the works in Swavesey.

Before topping up the oil tank to see through the winter months it might be the right time to consider joining an oil buying scheme.



Cambridgeshire ACRE's community oil buying scheme is designed to help purchasers of central heating oil to make savings by buying in bulk. The scheme is open to anyone in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough. Community buildings such as churches and village halls as well as businesses which are reliant upon heating oil can join too. The annual membership fee for domestic users is £20 and covers as many oil orders as you need during the course of the year.

Through our partnership with AF Affinity Limited, a subsidiary of Anglia Farmers Limited, the leading agricultural purchasing co-operative in the United Kingdom, the scheme makes the most of collective purchasing power.

The average saving is usually 2pence per litre against online prices .In July and August this year members who ordered oil in these months got it at less than 50 pence per litre (exclusive of VAT at 5%). The environment benefits too as every time a tanker comes out to make a delivery, it is using a lot of diesel – a full tanker can get as little as a horrifying 8 miles per gallon. If deliveries are organised so that one tanker delivers to several customers in a village, instead of making lots of individual deliveries, the fuel consumption is reduced and so is traffic in the village.

- . You can recycle all your Christmas cards and wrapping paper in the blue bin.
- You can compost all leftover food (cooked and raw) and real Christmas frees (cut up)
 in the cases big.
- Excess blue bin material will routinely be collected when placed alongside the blue bin in a returnable container or cardboard box
- Excess black bin waste will be collected if placed alongside the bin on the first scheduled black bin collection
 after the New Year only.

Introducing Police Sergeant Mark Rabel

Please allow me to introduce myself. I am Police Sergeant Mark Rabel based at Histon Station and have responsibility for the Histon Panel area – which embraces your village. I've been in post now for about 3 months. For your information I live in this area and have three kids – the two youngest attend local schools. What happens in this area – also affects me – I have a vested interest in your village!

South Cambridgeshire continues to enjoy a status of being a safe place to live and work. Our biggest crime problem continues to be burglaries with an average of one a day being committed throughout the area. Sounds a lot? Our geographic patch is approximately 350 square miles – it's a massive area to patrol. A typical MO is that a window is smashed with an untidy search of the house before people make off with small valuables. Its an awful experience for the victim of such a crime with a feeling of violation and the cost of replacing stolen items, repairing windows and changing locks. Awful. In the last several weeks we have apprehended and charged 8 individuals with burglary – interestingly all bar one of these thieves lived outside South Cambridgeshire – suggesting that our area is targeted by criminals. Preventing burglary and catching offenders remains our top local priority.

You can help by keeping vigilant for suspicious activity in your area and calling 999 if you feel something is amiss. Statistically there are very few successful burglaries where there is (Continued on next page)

 Make sure they confirm to the British Standard and never overload plug sockets.

Creating a safer

Cambridgeshire

The coming Festive Season may be for some a time that is especially hard, as they may have been recently subject to crime. There is new help available should you know someone who is a victim.

"THE VICTIMS HUB"

"The Victims' Hub" has been established to offer help and support to anyone impacted by crime. This service is available even if the crime has not been reported to the police. The Hub support workers are fully trained to assist victims of all ages and to support relatives of victims. This service has been provided in Cambridgeshire and in six other forces in order to give local people, local support. This has been funded by the Ministry of Justice who are seeking to ensure that the victims' needs are at the heart of any crime or ASB simation.

So what will happen if you ask for help or if others suggest that you might be in need of help? There will firstly be a number of simple questions such as enquiring as into your current circumstance so that the right help can be found for you. You will then be referred to someone who can best meet your needs.

Any assistance offered to you will be personalised for you as everyone reacts differently in any given situation. Responses to situations can also often be dependent on what support friends and family can give to any individual. The aim of this process will be recovery that is both emotional and practical.

Access to this new "Hub" can be by personal enquiry; through attending police officers or other agencies recognising a need. They are being trained to watch out for such needs in any crime situation, even if not directly expressed by the victim or their family. The service is free and available to anyone who has been affected by a crime.

You are invited and very welcome to attend. For those that already know me I am also happy to talk about cricket!

Some Give When They Take Away

Swavesey Parish Council has received to date, £436 from Wiser Electrical Recycling, an ethical electrical collection company. This will be used for our own village's Community Projects. Giving to Wiser Electrical Recycling means that we not only know that they keep to the highest ethical and environmental guidelines but that they give back to the village a proportion of the profit that they make. They will come back in April or May next year, please, if you can, save your unwanted electrical items for them.

Swavesey village has benefited for years from our local Swavesey scrapyard. The owners and their family have served our village by way of public service for a very long time. They have assisted village organisations; the Swavesey Carol Service and at other events. They keep to all the E.U. regulations and dispose of items according to the law. They are registered scrap dealers. They add value to our village by being here. Olby Smith can be contacted on 0.1954 230306

Others Just Take

Unregulated and unregistered itinerant dealers visit the village regularly. Just prior to writing this, villagers' items "went missing" during such a visit. A person was threatened. Someone whose skip was empty had their driveway spat upon. Such persons adhere to no ethical or moral codes. Unwanted items are dumped into the countryside. No regulations are adhered to and with no paperwork to be checked, quite possibly tax would be hard to collect. To give to them when they come just brings them back again.

The police have requested that we do not give to them. They have reminded us that to give scrap and waste to unlicensed dealers, who then dispose of it unlawfully, is an offence. The fine is large.

As a community organisation we request that you do not give to them but rather support those who give when they receive, to the benefit of all.
